Overview of Hebrews

- Theme:
 - To present Jesus Christ as deity, and as better than all human beings and angels;
 - to prove that Judaism and the law have come to an end;
 - to confirm Jewish Christians in the faith;
 - and to set forth new covenant doctrines for all people.

Overview of Hebrews

- Statistics:
 - 58th book of the Bible;
 - 13 chapters; 303 verses; 6,913 words;
 - 17 questions;
 - 270 verses of history;
 - 9 verses of fulfilled
 - 24 verses of unfulfilled prophecy.

Time of Writing?

- Written from Rome about 68 A.D.
 - along with Galatians and 2nd Timothy

- Luke, Philip, Barnabas, Clement etc.

Authorship?

- Arguments for Paul's authorship are:
- *The thoughts and reasonings are Paul's.*
- *Any difference in style is due to his writing to Jews as a Jew and not to Gentile churches as in other epistles.*
 - *Furthermore, the translation of the book into Greek by Luke may account for some change in style.*
- *Peter confirms the fact that Paul wrote an epistle to Jews (2Pet. 3:15-16).*
- *The book of Hebrews is ascribed to him by over 100 ancient writers in both Greek and Latin, from 70 to 73 A.D.*

Authorship?

- Arguments for Paul's authorship are:
- *It was received as Paul's:*
- *by the council of Laodicea (363 A.D.),*
- *by the council of Carthage (397 A.D.),*
- *by the Syrian churches (370 A.D.),*
- *and generally by the Greeks and Eastern churches from the earliest centuries.*
- *Paul is named as the author in the Alexandrian manuscripts (500 A.D.).*

Authorship?

- Arguments for Paul's authorship are:
- *Some Latin churches questioned it only because Paul's name is not used in the introduction as in all his other epistles, but this was for two reasons:*
- *Eusebius, the father of church history, explains that Paul wrote the epistle in Hebrew, leaving his name off so that it would be read and received more readily by Jews who hated him and would not want to listen to anything he had to say.*
- *Luke translated it into Greek, hence it is similar to Acts in expression.*
 - *See The Ante-Nicene Fathers, Vol. 2, p. 579*

Authorship?

- Arguments for Paul's authorship are:
- *In oldest manuscripts the epistle follows Galatians with the title "To the Hebrews," indicating that it was part of the Galatian letter.*
- *If this is true, the authorship stated in Gal. 1:1 applies to both books.*
- *This would explain why Paul speaks of Galatians as "a large letter" (Heb. 6:11).*
- *"The Israel of God" of Gal. 6:16 would be an appropriate introduction to the book of Hebrews.*

Authorship?

- Arguments for Paul's authorship are:
- *There is nothing in the epistle contrary to Paul's authorship, and there is much internal evidence that Paul was the author:*
- *Both books [Galatians & Hebrews] argue at length on the abolishment of the old covenant.*
- *Both anticipate the visit of the writer (Gal. 4:20; Heb. 13:19).*
- *Paul was the only writer of the New Testament who requested prayer for himself (cp. Heb. 13:18 with note, 2Th. 3:1).*

Authorship?

- Arguments for Paul's authorship are:
- *Many exhortations in Hebrews are similar to those of other epistles of Paul: Compare:*
 - *Heb. 12:3 with Gal. 6:9;*
 - *Heb. 12:14 with Rom. 12:18;*
 - *Heb. 13:1-3 with Eph. 5:2-4*
 - *Heb. 13:16 with Php. 4:18;*
 - *Heb. 5:12 with 1Cor. 3:2;*
 - *Heb. 8:1 with Eph. 1:20;*
 - *Heb. 8:6; 9:15; 12:24; Gal. 3:19-20 1Tim. 2:5; Heb. 10:1 with Col. 2:17;*
 - *Heb. 10:33 with 1Cor. 4:9;*
 - *Heb. 13:9 with Eph. 4:14;*
 - *Heb. 13:10 with 1Cor. 9:13; 10:18;*
 - *Heb. 13:20-21 with Rom. 15:33; 16:20; 2Cor. 13:11; Php. 4:9; 1Th. 5:23;*
 - *Heb. 13:22 with Acts 24:16;*

Authorship?

- Arguments for Paul's authorship are:
- *The author of both books wrote from Italy (Heb. 13:24).*
- *Paul was the only New Testament writer who wrote from prison and expected release (Heb. 13:19,23 with Php. 1:7-8,13,26; 2:23-24 etc.).*
- *No other writer of epistles mentions Timothy.*
 - *Paul refers to him 20 times in his recognized epistles (cp. Heb. 13:23).*
- *When Paul mentions Timothy to others he always call him brother (2Cor. 1:1; Col. 1:1; 1Th. 3:2)*
- *The conclusion of the epistle is like others of Paul*
 - *(cp. Heb. 13:18-25 with the end of his other epistles).*

Background to Hebrews

- The Church in Jerusalem:
 - Had already lost Stephen Acts 7:59,60
 - James the Apostle Acts 12:2
 - Others Acts 8:1-3,26:10
- The Church in Galatia was also now facing persecution: Gal 1:22
 - Principally from the legalistic Jews who saw Christianity as a rejection of the Law
- The temptation was to revert to Judaism to avoid persecution

Author's Objectives?

- Combat possible apostasy 2:1-4, 10:19-25
- Encourage them to press on to Spiritual maturity 5:11-14, 10:32-39
- Comfort them in their persecutions 11:1-12:3

What is at stake?

- What are these believers going to lose, forfeit, or suffer?
 - Not “salvation” John 10:28,29; et al
 - Rewards at the Judgment Seat of Christ
- We cannot escape this by applying it to others
- The burden of ‘Hebrews’ is *not* the rescuing sinners from hell:
It is the bringing of sons to glory

Bringing Sons Unto Glory

Bringing Sons Unto Glory

- *The only "Life" of the Lord Jesus is the New Testament. There are phases of the Life of Our Lord presented in the New Testament that no other Life, so-called, deals with. If you start with the theory that Jesus Christ was a man who became God, you have to leave out any number of New Testament facts; if you say that Jesus Christ was God and His manhood a seeming phase, you have to miss out other facts. The Person of Jesus Christ revealed in the New Testament is unique—God-Man. In Him we deal with God as Man, the God-Man, the Representative of the whole human race in one Person. Jesus Christ is not a Being with two personalities; He is Son of God—the exact expression of Almighty God, and Son of Man—the presentation of God's normal Man.*

Bringing Sons Unto Glory

Bringing Sons Unto Glory

- He did not take us out this far to lead us back again!

- His goal: not just deliverance from Egypt, but to the Promised Land (Gen 14:13-17; Ex 3:7,8).

“In other words, the deliverance from Egypt was only in preparation for the enjoyment of Canaan. The Passover, the shedding of blood, the crossing of the Red Sea, the destruction of Pharaoh's hosts, all would have been useless unless they led to the place of rest in Canaan. Furthermore, it was only by possession of the land of Canaan that the promise of God to Abraham could be fulfilled.”

Entering Into Our Rest

¹ And it came to pass in the four hundred and eightieth year after the children of Israel were come out of the land of Egypt, in the fourth year of Solomon's reign over Israel, in the month Zif, which is the second month, that he began to build the house of the LORD.

² And the house which king Solomon built for the LORD, the length thereof was threescore cubits, and the breadth thereof twenty cubits, and the height thereof thirty cubits.

³ And the porch before the temple of the house, twenty cubits was the length thereof, according to the breadth of the house; and ten cubits was the breadth thereof before the house.

⁴ And for the house he made windows of narrow lights.

⁵ And against the wall of the house he built chambers round about, against the walls of the house round about, both of the temple and of the oracle: and he made chambers round about:

⁶ The nethermost chamber was five cubits broad, and the middle was six cubits broad, and the third was seven cubits broad: for without in the wall of the house he made narrowed rests round about, that the beams should not be fastened in the walls of the house.

⁷ And the house, when it was in building, was built of stone made ready before it was brought thither: so that there was neither hammer nor axe nor any tool of iron heard in the house, while it was in building.

Living Stones

- 1 Wherefore laying aside all malice, and all guile, and hypocrisies, and envies, and all evil speakings,

Living Stones

5 Ye also, as lively stones, are built up a spiritual house, an holy priesthood, to offer up spiritual sacrifices, acceptable to God by Jesus Christ.

- *We are in the quarry now and God is hewing us out. God's Spirit gathers and marks the stones, then they have to be blasted out of their holdings by the dynamite of the Holy Ghost, to be chiselled and shaped, and then lifted into the heavenly places. God grant that many may go through the quarrying and the chiselling and the placing. Think of the scrutiny of Jesus Christ that each one of us has to face! Think of His eyes fastening on us and pointing us out before God as He says—"Father, that is My work; that is the meaning of Gethsemane, that is the meaning of Calvary. I did all that man's work in him, all that woman's work in her; now You can use them."*
