

### **James**

- The half-brother of Jesus.
- Considered by the early church as a son of Mary and Joseph.
  - Jerome, Augustine, et al.
  - See also Matthew 12:46, 47; 13:55; Mark 3:31, 32; Luke 8:19, 20; 1 Cor 9:5.
- Unbeliever before the resurrection: John 7:5.
- The Lord specifically appeared to James (1 Cor 15:7) following which he became a believer & the head of the Church in Jerusalem
  - Acts 15 / Gal 2:9

### **James**

- He was married (1 Cor 9:5)
- When Peter was released from prison he instructed them to tell James (Acts 12:17)
- Paul reported to him upon arrival in Jerusalem
  - Gal 1:18 / Acts 21:17-26
- His name was used by the Judaizers saying they had 'come from James' (Gal 2:12).
  - Note that he had already disavowed having authorised them to use his name as an endorsement of their legal teachings (Acts 15:24)

## Jesus' Earthly Family

Is not this the carpenter's son? is not his mother called Mary? and his brethren, James, and Joses, and Simon, and Judas? And his sisters, are they not all with us?

Matthew 13:55-56

- At least a family of 7 children
  - 4 brothers & 2 sisters
    - James always mentioned first indicating he was the eldest (after Jesus)

## Time of Writing?

- Written within 10 years of the Resurrection
- c.40 A.D

- James shows the importance of
  - Conduct over Creed
  - Behaviour over Belief
  - Deed over Doctrine
- James' Epistle is intensely practical for the Christian growing in knowledge & grace
- It is a fitting follow-on from Hebrews which gives the 'why?' of Christian living...
- James gives us the 'how'

## Yakov's Letter to the 12 Tribes

- James used nature to illustrate spiritual truth thirty times in five short chapters.
- There are frequent references to the law in this Letter. It is called "the perfect law" (1:25), "the royal law" (2:8), and "the law of liberty" (2:12).
  - James does not teach that his readers are under law for salvation or as a rule of life.
  - Rather, portions of the law are cited as instruction in righteousness for those who are under grace.


Key words: Brethren x 15

- The most authoritarian letter in the NT?
- James issues instructions more profusely than any of the other writers.
- In the 108 verses, there are 54 commands

Vs 1-15 Overview

### Chapter 1: 1-15 Review

- How do you handle life's trials? vs 1-5
  - As a follower of Christ don't you realise that they are part of your Heavenly Brother's training programme for you? So you should count them as joy!
- How do you pray? vs. 6-8
  - Do you pray in faith? Or do you doubt that God would hear you? James knew his Brother and trusted Him implicitly! James tells us we can (and should) do the same.
- How do you treat others? vs. 9-11
  - Does your opinion of them depend on your estimate of their worth. James had made this mistake and for years had lived with someone but only seeing them through his own eyes and not through God's!

## Chapter 1: 1-15 Review

- How do you deal with temptation? vs. 12-15
  - You cannot blame others, temptations come from within. James had lived with One who had never yielded to temptation, and now knew first-hand that Jesus is able to impart that same grace and strength in each one of us to enable us to be overcomers! and there is a reward promised to all who overcome temptation!


## **Temptations**

- Temptations will come
- A blessing is promised if we endure them
- We are expected to endure them
- God is not the source of temptations (Isaiah 45:7)
  - so note that they are different from trials!
- Don't blame God for temptations
- The Devil is also not the primary source of temptations

## **Temptations**

- Our hearts and minds are fertile soil where temptations can grow
- This is why what may be a temptation to one may not be to another
- We are commanded not to 'go astray' or 'wander'
- Temptations will result in death, progressively
  - starting as possibly innocuous



**Vs** 16-27

**James 1:16** 

- "Do not be deceived...!
- Do not continue being deceived!
  - Don't blame God for temptations
  - Don't blame the devil!
  - Remember that Eve was tempted BEFORE she fell
  - All the devil has in his toolbox are:
    - The lust of the flesh
    - The lust of the eyes
    - The pride of life

(see 1John 2:16)


- In contrast to temptations...
  - Which are apparent shortcuts legitimate things but in an illegitimate way
- ...That which God gives are true and pure!
- We must 'study to show ourselves approved'
- Our minds must be renewed & transformed

- The contrast is between the 'father of lies' and the Father of lights!
- "Variableness" Gr. parallage (Parallax)
  - "the effect by which the position of an object seems to change when it is looked at from different positions"



<sup>18</sup> Of his own will begat he us with the word of truth, that we should be a kind of firstfruits of his creatures.

- We have been begotten with the Word
- The world was spoken into existence...
- Life began with the spoken word....
- "The word properly signifies, He did the office of a mother to us, the bringing us into the light of life." (Trapp)

- And the servant of the Lord must not strive; but be gentle unto all men, apt to teach, patient,
  - 2 Tim 2:22
    - Apt to teach literally means 'Teachable"
- "Go not forth hastily to strive, lest thou know not what to do in the end thereof, when thy neighbour hath put thee to shame".
  - Prov 25:4


<sup>20</sup> For the wrath of man worketh not the righteousness of God.

- What do we think we will accomplish by wrath?
- I've seldom regretted things I didn't say!

Wherefore lay apart all filthiness and superfluity of naughtiness, and receive with meekness the engrafted word, which is able to save your souls.

- Superfluity = 'an overflow' ...of wickedness
- "The stinking filth of a pestilent ulcer. Sin is the devil's vomit, the soul's excrement, the superfluity or garbage of naughtiness [wickedness]... as it is here called by an allusion to the garbage of the sacrifices cast into the brook Kedron, that is, the town-ditch." (Trapp)
- Note how important the Word is!!

# Biblical Psychology 101



But be ye doers of the word, and not hearers only, deceiving your own selves.

James 1:22

 Jesus used this same point to conclude His great Sermon on the Mount. He said that the one who heard the word without doing it was like a man who built his house on the sand, but the one who heard God's word and did it was like a man whose house was built on a rock. The one who both heard and did God's word could withstand the inevitable storms of life and the judgment of eternity (Matthew 7:24-27).

But be ye doers of the word, and not hearers only, deceiving your own selves.

James 1:22

 "I fear we have many such in all congregations; admiring hearers, affectionate hearers, attached hearers, but all the while unblest hearers, because they are not doers of the word." (Spurgeon) <sup>23</sup> For if any be a hearer of the word, and not a doer, he is like unto a man beholding his natural face in a glass:

<sup>24</sup> For he beholdeth himself, and goeth his way, and straightway forgetteth what manner of man he was.

James 1:23-24

"The ancient Greek word translated 'beholding'
has the idea of a careful scrutiny. By application,
James had in mind people who give a careful
scrutiny of God's word; they may be regarded as
Bible experts but it still doesn't result in doing"

<sup>23</sup> For if any be a hearer of the word, and not a doer, he is like unto a man beholding his natural face in a glass:

• "The glass of the Word is not like our ordinary lookingglass, which merely shows us our external features; but, according to the Greek of our text, the man sees in it 'the face of his birth'; that is, the face of his nature. He that reads and hears the Word may see not only his actions there, but his motives, his desires, his inward condition."

- Do we study God's Word like we study our own appearance?
- Do we spend as much time in God's Word as we do in front of the mirror?
- Time in front of a mirror can only impact the outward beauty...
- ...time in God's Word, the whole person!

If any man among you seem to be religious, and bridleth not his tongue, but deceiveth his own heart, this man's religion is vain

James 1:26

<sup>27</sup> Pure religion and undefiled before God and the Father is this, To visit the fatherless and widows in their affliction, and to keep himself unspotted from the world.

- This is the 'greatest commandment'
- Love your neighbor as yourself...
- Love the Lord your God with all your heart, soul, mind and strength! (Mark 12:29-31)
