



John's Reason for Writing

- John tells us his 5 reasons for writing:
 - That which we have seen and heard declare we unto you, <u>that ye also may have fellowship</u> with us 1:3
 - And these things write we unto you, <u>that your joy may</u>
 <u>be full</u>. 1:4
 - these things write I unto you, that ye sin not 2:1
 - These things have I written unto you <u>concerning them</u> <u>that seduce you</u>. 2:26
 - These things have I written unto you that believe on the name of the Son of God; <u>that ye may know that ye</u> <u>have eternal life</u>, and that ye may believe on the name of the Son of God. 5:13
 - That you learn what Love really is

Whosoever believeth that Jesus is the Christ is born of God: and every one that loveth him that begat loveth him also that is begotten of him. **1 John 5:1**

- Our principle goal is to love Jesus
- Do you simply hope it's going to happen?
- How do you measure it?
- Do you love Jesus more now than this time last year?
- What can you do to love Jesus more?
- If you don't really love Jesus, do you really know Him?

² By this we know that we love the children of God, when we love God, and keep his commandments.
 ³ For this is the love of God, that we keep his commandments: and his commandments are not grievous.

- These three are intertwined
 - Loving God
 - Keeping His commandments
 - Loving God's children

⁴ For whatsoever is born of God overcometh the world: and this is the victory that overcometh the world, even our faith.

⁵ Who is he that overcometh the world, but he that believeth that Jesus is the Son of God? **1 John 5:4-5**

- Overcoming the world is here linked to keeping His commandments
 - If you believe that Jesus is the Son of God, you will love God
 - If you love God, you will keep His commandments
 - If you keep His commandments you will overcome the world
 - Faith underpins all of this!

 "Look at any Greek lexicon you like, and you will find that the word [faith or believe] does not merely mean to believe, but to trust, to confide in, to commit to, entrust with, and so forth; the very marrow of the meaning of faith is confidence in, reliance upon." (Spurgeon)

 "He who came by water and blood: John makes it clear that the Jesus he speaks of is not the Gnostic, "phantom" Jesus who was so holy that He had nothing to do with this world. The Jesus we must believe on is the Jesus who came by water and blood; the Jesus who was part of a real, material, flesh-and-blood earth". – David Guzik Jesus answered, Verily, verily, I say unto thee, Except a man be born of water and of the Spirit, he cannot enter into the kingdom of God.

- John 3:5
- Jesus here spoke to Nicodemus of 2 births
- A natural birth (by water)
- A Spiritual birth (through faith)
- Born one (physical only), die twice (physical and spiritual)
- Born twice (physical and spiritual), die once (physical only)

- Actually...
- For believers:
 - You are born naturally (1), but dead in trespasses and sin (Eph 2:1) (1)
 - You are then born again Spiritually (John 3:16) (2) to never die spiritually again
 - You may die physically (Heb 9:27) if you are not Raptured (2)
 - But you will then get to eat of the Tree of Life (Rev 2:7) and physically live eternally (3)
- But for unbelievers:
 - They are born naturally (1), but dead in trespasses and sin (1)
 - They will die physically (2),
 - They will be subject to the '2nd Death' (3) when they will be eternally dammed

Born of the Spirit

In Adam all die... 1 Cor 15:22

- The punishment for sin was death (Gen 2:17 / Rom 6:23)
- In the Garden of Eden all humanity died spiritually
- Unless we are 're-born' spiritually be receiving God's Spirit within us, we cannot enter the kingdom of heaven, we will remain spiritually dead
- In Christ shall all be made alive... 1 Cor 15:22
- God is the 'Father of Spirits' Heb 12:9
- Whatever is born of God does not sin (1 John 3:9 / 1 John 5:18)

 Some believe that water speaks of our own baptism, and blood speaks of receiving communion, and that John writes of how Jesus comes to us in the two Christian sacraments of baptism and communion (Luther and Calvin had this idea). Yet, if this is the case, it doesn't add up with the historical perspective John had when he wrote "came by water and blood." He seems to write of something that happened in the past, not something that is ongoing.

Others (such as Augustine) believe the water and blood ulletdescribes the water and blood which flowed from Jesus' side when He was stabbed with a spear on the cross: "But one of the soldiers pierced His side with a spear, and immediately blood and water came out" (John 19:34). This was an important event to the Apostle John because immediately after this description of water and blood, he added in his gospel: "And he who has seen has testified, and his testimony is true; and he knows that he is telling the truth, so that you may believe" (John 19:35). Yet, if this was John's meaning, it is a little unclear how it can be said that Jesus came by water and blood.

 Still others believe the water spoke of Jesus' first birth, being born of the "waters of the womb," and blood speaks of His death. If this is the case, John would be essentially writing, "Jesus was born like a man and died like a man. He was completely human, not some superspiritual being who had no real contact with the material world." The Gnostics in John's day thought of Jesus as just such a super-spiritual being.

 Probably the best explanation (though there are good points to some of the other ideas) is the oldest recorded Christian understanding of this passage (first recorded by the ancient Christian Tertullian). Most likely, John means the water of Jesus' baptism, and the blood of His crucifixion.

 When Jesus was baptized, He was not baptized in repentance for His own sin (He had none), but because He wanted to completely identify with sinful humanity. When He came by water, it was His way of saying, "I am one of you."

 When Jesus died on the cross, He did not die because He had to (death could have no power over Him), but He laid down His life to identify with sinful humanity and to save us from our sin. When He came by... blood it was so that He could stand in our place as a guilty sinner, and to take the punishment our sin deserved.

- "Came..." past tense (this has happened)
- "By water..." = Natural birth (using the same idiom as in John 3)?
- "and blood..." = His sacrificial death in our place without which we could never be redeemed
- Water = Natural / Blood = Divine
- Jesus was perfect God and Man in one


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

The Oldest Manuscripts?

- The footnotes of most modern translations state that particular verses are 'not found in the oldest & most reliable mss.'
- By this they mean Vaticanus and Sinaiticus
- We now know that both of these are 'modern' forgeries – and translated from the Vulgate
- The Vulgate itself was translated from the Alexandrian mss.
- Almost all modern versions of the Bible now come from this source.

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1 John 5:7-8 (the Johanan Comer)

- Not found in any Greek manuscript before the 16th C?
- It appears in the writing of Theophilus of Antioch 180 A.D.
- It is quoted by Cyprian, at Carthage, in 250AD
- It is part of the text for Latin manuscript 'R' c. 300 A.D.
- It's quoted by two Spanish bishops in 385 AD, (Prisillian and Adatious Clarus).
- It is quoted by many African bishops in the fourth century (430 to 480 AD) in arguments against Arianism.
- It's quoted by Casiadorus a church leader in Italy in 480 AD
- There is a Greek grammatical structural problem if you remove it.
- It is used satirically by Lucian of Samasata c.116 A.D. (46y)

Why does it matter?

- Attorney Irwin H. Linton said the following:
- "The infallibility of the record upon which rest the eternal essentials of our faith – the deity of Christ, His voluntary, atoning death, bodily resurrection and impending return in power and glory – are all rendered uncertain in a mind in which the accuracy of the Bible record is in doubt."

Why does it matter?

- "A lady phoned me in a concerned frame of mind following an encounter with Jehovah's Witnesses. The conversation had turned to the Trinity and she had confidently turned to 1 John 5:7-8 to 'prove' that it was in the Bible. She was shocked to be informed by her callers that the verses she quoted didn't belong in the Bible, they are a later addition. The call to me was to confirm the facts.
- A good, modern, study Bible I have the NIV open before me will tell you that the deliciously tempting clause, "testify in heaven: the Father, the Word and the Holy Spirit, and these three are one. And there are three that testify on earth: the", is not found in any manuscript or translation before the 16th Century.
- When I told her she replied in consternation, "But I've been using those verses for thirty years!""

If we receive the witness of men, the witness of God is greater: for this is the witness of God which he hath testified of his Son.

He that believeth on the Son of God hath the witness in himself: he that believeth not God hath made him a liar; because he believeth not the record that God gave of his Son.

¹⁶ If any man see his brother sin a sin which is not unto death, he shall ask, and he shall give him life for them that sin not unto death. There is a sin unto death: I do not say that he shall pray for it.

- Lying to the Holy Spirit? see Acts 5:1-11
 - Even in this instance there is no suggestion that Salvation is forfeited
 - Scripture speaks about loosing your reward, but not your Salvation
- Nadab & Abihu Lev 10
- Achan Joshua 7
 - In both cases God intervened and brought judgment because there had been a direct violation of His Word

- ⁷ All unrighteousness is sin: and there is a sin not unto death.


